WEATHERING THE ECONOMIC STORM

We started 2009 with much uncertainty. Markets were down, foundations across Canada were reducing or even eliminating payouts and Niagara's economy was significantly affected by the economic downturn.

Given how these external factors could and were effecting our work, the board held a special retreat early in 2009 to recalibrate our strategic plan. From this retreat came three key strategies: focus our granting on four areas (poverty reduction, environment, children and youth and providing assistance to agencies through these challenging times), place a higher priority on securing non-endowed donations that could be re-granted during the year, and, identify a unique community leadership role for the foundation.

As the year came to an end we were pleased to report that over half a million dollars was distributed as grants, which included over \$125,000 in poverty reduction initiatives. This was the 2nd highest amount in our 10 year history. These grants came from interest and dividend income on our endowment in combination with non-endowed donations from many donors.

The board also approved launching a pilot program in 2010 called "Change the Game", where we will work with ten mid-sized voluntary organizations in helping them identify new ways of working together – mainly from a back-office or infrastructure perspective.

As we launched our 10th anniversary year in November, we were thankful for the support and encouragement from our many donors, volunteers, supporters and staff. Anniversaries, especially those that mark decades, give us those formal opportunities to thank, to reflect and to acknowledge. Our vision of "realizing community dreams through philanthropy" is evident through the generosity that the current generation has given to the future, has given to Niagara. We thank you all for your generosity.

GRANTS ENABLE COMMUNITY DREAMS

COLLABORATION WILL AID NEW CANADIANS

A new umbrella organization, Niagara Multicultural Services, was recently formed to allow Niagara's multicultural organizations to work together more collaboratively. A grant from the Niagara Community Foundation supported this new initiative by funding a strategic planning session involving representatives of the Folk Arts Council of St. Catharines, the Fort Erie Multicultural Centre, the Multicultural Network of Niagara Falls and the Welland Heritage Council and Multicultural Centre.

"The multicultural organizations in Niagara were very pleased to get the support of the Niagara Community Foundation to have a strategic planning day with all of the Boards and key management staff, for the first time in the history of multicultural centres," explains Claire Masswohl, CEO of Niagara Multicultural Services of Welland and Niagara Falls.

The session resulted in the design of the collaborative approach to service delivery, along with development of a mission and vision statement and a list of key strategic thrusts to work on. The strategy developed by the group will allow each agency to remain an individual entity, while working with the others to ensure seamless and effective services to immigrants and New Canadians across the Region. *

ASSISTING NIAGARA'S JOB SEEKERS

Entering or re-entering the multi-generational workplace of today brings with it inherent challenges – challenges which are magnified for marginalized populations. A consortium of community based partner agencies, the Niagara Resources Network, identified the need for a free, appropriate resource available to guide and equip these workers to navigate in this changed environment.

The Niagara Community Foundation provided a grant to this group to develop a guide to be used by participants at their employment centres across the Region. The guide is specifically designed to help workers who are laid-off, dissatisfied, over-qualified, or returning to work, as well as newcomers to Canada and aboriginal workers, via case studies, suggested solutions, and inventories of support services.

According to Margaret Maynard, Executive Director of Literacy Council of Niagara West, the grant was "definitely a case where a little produced a lot. A small infusion of funding provided by the Foundation allowed a representative group of eight Niagara employment and literacy service providers to develop and produce 10,000 copies of a much-needed resource to assist the jobseeker in Niagara." *

GUIDING LOCAL THEATRE ALONG THE WAY

Carousel Players, a professional theatre company that produces entertaining and inspiring plays for young audiences, tours its work into schools and theatres, inspiring creativity and stimulating the imagination of thousands of children.

One of the challenges inherent in this touring activity is navigating the company's vans, carrying stage managers and actors, to the locations of over 60 schools within the Niagara Region and as far afield as Pittsburgh. A grant from the Niagara Community Foundation provided two GPS navigation systems for Carousel Players' touring productions of Bluenose and George and Martha.

"By the end of this season, we will have toured to 101 schools (16 schools outside of Niagara), performing to over 23,000 children," says Jane Gardner, General Manager. "The GPS units we purchased are invaluable tools to navigate from our St. Catharines base to school gyms all over southwestern Ontario. We now have voice directional step by step directions on how to get to schools, gas stations and restaurants, and the perfect touring tool on the road."

TOY PURCHASES SUPPORT CHILDREN OF TEENS

Providing a stimulating environment for the children of teens via quality child care is just one of the ways that Adolescent's Family Support Services Niagara (AFSSN) is dedicated to ending the cycle of teen pregnancy and the poverty associated with it. The largest program supporting adolescent parents in the Niagara region, AFSSN fosters the independence of young families pursuing an education, and provides child care at several sites throughout Niagara.

The Niagara Community Foundation provided a grant to purchase toys and equipment for these child care sites. From bicycles to blocks, and dolls to puzzles, the toys will stimulate cognitive, fine and gross motor skills, math and reading readiness skills, and promote healthy physical activities. The toys will be used to enhance a program that supports 110 children.

"AFSSN's childcare centres and CAPC Niagara Brighter Futures centres are able to rotate toys and equipment between sites to facilitate optimal learning opportunities for our children and families," said Stacy Wilcox, Supervisor at the Welland Parent Child Centre. "We greatly appreciate the Niagara Community Foundation's support, assisting AFSSN to deliver high quality interactive education."

ESTATE TO BENEFIT ANIMAL WELFARE

Earl Clarke passed away in his mid-90's at a retirement home in St. Catharines. A recognizable figure who tirelessly walked the city and constantly travelled the area by public transit, Earl was a retired businessman who had no children and outlived most of his peers.

With no one to inherit the money he saved over his lifetime, Earl decided to leave his estate to two different organizations. Wanting part of his bequest to stay in the community he had come to call home, Earl donated part of his estate to the Niagara Community Foundation. In keeping with his personal wishes, he established an endowed, named field of interest fund to be used for the protection and preservation of animals and wildlife.

John Potts, now retired as a Financial Advisor at BMO Harris Private Banking, worked with Earle on his bequests, and says, "This Fund illustrates how any individual can give back to their community and direct that giving to their own personal area of concern, via a bequest to the Niagara Community Foundation." *

TWO GENERATIONS PARTICIPATE IN FAMILY FUND

"Our father is an incredibly hard working and generous man. He is humble and modest and we are very proud of his success." This sentiment, expressed by Kevin Hay's three daughters, is echoed by his wife, Kim, who explains how these traits led to the establishment of the Hay Family Fund.

Kevin wanted to ensure that the core values of hard work and philanthropy were passed along to his daughters. "When we heard about the Niagara Community Foundation, we thought this would be the perfect opportunity to teach our daughters about the joy of giving back," says Kim. "Giving our daughters this perspective has opened our eyes to the incredible number of people in need in our community."

In Kevin's own words, he wants his support to be used as directly as possible in his own community of Niagara Falls. "I didn't necessarily like the idea of sending money to a large corporate type charity. I want our contributions to have local impact, and to direct them to specific needs." Both Kevin and Kim hope that what they have started with their daughters will be continued for generations to come. *



A FIRM SUPPORTER

Our 2002 Annual Report featured the Sullivan Mahoney Endowment Fund, established to honour the law firm's 50th Anniversary. Eight years later, this Fund has reached its goal of raising \$25,000 and is making a real difference in the community.

Partner Victor Muratori, a past Foundation board member, explains that among the many reasons for the firm's support, "no single individual did more to influence our participation than the urgings of the late Frank Branscombe, who spent a good part of his very active life not only funding but also working for charitable causes."

The firm's partners and staff make weekly contributions with Friday Dress Down Days along with other donations that flow through the Fund. These dollars have already supported the operating funds of the Foundation and assisted organizations including Child Advocacy Centre of Niagara, Niagara Health System, and YMCA of Niagara.

WILLIAM CHARRON Mr. Charron is the former Executive Director of Family and Children's Services Niagara. He is currently a director of Kids Help Phone board and an accreditation reviewer for Family Services Canada. He is currently a member of the West Lincoln Hospital Board of Governors.

RENA MCDONALD Ms. McDonald is the CEO of Vintage Hotels Management and Development Group and a director and officer of The Vintage Hotels group of companies. She holds a CMA accounting designation and served previously as a member of the Hotel Financial & Technology Professions board of directors. She is also a former member of the Ministry of Tourism Policy Advisory Council and the Financial Advisory Council of Holy Cross Church in Thorold. Rena's experience with the Foundation has been "inspiring." "The Foundation impacts so profoundly on the lesser known groups and organizations that may otherwise go unnoticed or have limited access to funds," she says.

KELLY ROBSON "What appealed to me most about the Niagara Community Foundation is it holds true to the old adage, 'charity begins at home', and provides a variety of ways in which one can give back to our community," says Ms. Robson. Ms. Robson is the Administrative Assistant for general surgeon Dr. Darrell Baker in Dunnville and has served as a canvasser and captain for the Ontario Heart & Stroke Foundation since 1998 and the parade coordinator for the Wainfleet Fall Fair Committee since 2005. She previously served for five years on the inaugural Niagara Trillium Grant Review Team and was the co-chair of the United Way of South Niagara's Wainfleet Campaign.

ROB WELCH Mr. Welch is a partner with the law firm of Lancaster Brooks & Welch. He is the Chancellor of the Anglican Diocese of Niagara and a board member of the United Way St. Catharines & District. A former board member and lifetime member of the YMCA of Niagara, Mr. Welch was the recipient of two Paul Harris Fellowships from the Rotary Club of St. Catharines South and is a member of the Order of Niagara, Anglican Diocese of Niagara. Mr. Welch finds it particularly gratifying to be involved as a board member of an organization "that is truly making a difference in the lives of many people and organizations throughout Niagara".

ENDOWMENT FUNDS CONTINUE TO GROW

The Foundation has a different face to each of our donors. We find that their gifts support a particular cause or fund or is given in honour or memory of an individual. Our role is to work with donors to ensure that their charitable intent is achieved through their gift. Thank you to those who chose to leave their legacy to the community through the Niagara Community Foundation.

There are many ways to make a gift to the foundation including cash, bequests, insurance policies, securities or property. However, with increasing demands for support, it is important to take the time to determine how to make “the best gift”, a gift that provides maximum benefit to the community that is within one’s capacity to give. In order to determine how to make “the best gift” consider these factors:

- Financial circumstances (i.e. financial resources and obligations)
- Personal circumstances
- Philanthropic objectives, such as:
 - Interest in a particular field of interest (i.e. arts, education, children and youth, seniors, the environment);
 - Provision of immediate or ongoing support;
 - Assurance of wise investment of your gift (regarding both investments and grants).

We strongly advise that you speak with your lawyer, accountant or estate planner to determine the best way to make a gift that maximizes your tax and estate goals. We also suggest that you speak to your family should you decide to leave a bequest. The foundation provides a variety of endowment fund options for donors to consider. Funds can be created during your lifetime or through your estate. Donations to create named funds can be gifted over a ten-year period and can be paid in monthly installments. As you imagine the possibilities for leaving your legacy, read through the options available to our donors.
